#### **Events & Activities**

- Orientation was held for the new International Students January 7 10. The International staff equipped 31 students with important information as they began their Mesa College journey.
- The Evaluations department is currently assisting students with their Petition to Graduate for Spring and Summer 2019 graduates. Go Olympians!
- Mesa College participated in the 39th Annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Parade alongside sister campuses
   City College, Miramar College and Continuing Education. Mesa's theme this year was Dream, Believe,
   Achieve and the float was a refined version of the float used last year, featuring photo collages depicting
   Mesa College students, faculty and staff on a series of vertical panels.
- The Career Center collaborated with Outreach Office for a middle school engagement event coordinated by Outreach. Our Career Peer Ambassadors joined Outreach Student Ambassadors for multiple middle school engagement events at Marston Middle School and Lewis Middle School. It was a great experience where our Career Ambassadors shared information about career services and career education programs.
- Welcome Week was an excellent time for the Student Health Services Nurses to provide free flu
  vaccinations, Peer Educators promoted our services with free give-away items and Linda Gibbins-Croft
  LCSW networked with students and encourage participation in the psychological counseling program.
- Mesa's final CUE Advisory Committee Meeting, hosted by Vice President Hands, was a successful summary of the committee's progress. The meeting included an overview of our edited Equity Crosswalk, an activity on putting the Crosswalk to use, a commitment to put the Crosswalk into practice and a group reflection on our 2 year project. Next Steps include soft implementation of the Crosswalk during Spring 2019, additional editing and campus-wide implementation Fall 2019.

#### **Innovations & Data**

- Mesa Journeys team participated in Meet and Greet event at Winter CRUISE. We had the chance to
  introduce the "Your Mesa Journeys" tool to students and gave them an opportunity to use the
  application. We have currently served close to 500 students!
- 86 % of Kearny Fast Track HS students received a grade of an 'A' or 'B' fall 2018!
- STAR TRIO is producing engaging student videos for its website.
- During the Fall 2018 semester The Stand provided services to 1217 individual students, giving out 21,888 items of food and 766 items of clothing.

- Our High Tech Center has processed 78 alternate media requests since December 1, 2018 and our test proctoring staff has proctored 434 exams since December 1, 2018.
- Outreach *Remind* text messages have become extremely popular as a means of communication. Students currently subscribed to receive Promise announcements via text message.
- San Diego Mesa College has been designated as a Military Friendly institution for 2019-2020. Many Thanks to Dr. Bridget Herrin and LaWanda Foster for working with the School of Student Development to complete the survey and supporting this effort.
- The Transfer Center has a plan to put students' wait time to use in the counseling center. The Transfer
  Center has invited our local SDEC schools other 4 year university partners to host tables during peak
  times. This allows students to use their waiting time productively as they learn about transfer
  opportunities.

#### **Policies & Procedures**

- Public Consulting Group, one of the county's CalWORKs contractors, has taken over the central region of San Diego and helping CalWORKS strengthen Pathways and support services for incoming and continuing students.
- The district has awarded a \$300 book grant to 454 Year 1 Promise students for Spring semester, in addition to the \$100 book grant these students received last semester. The book grant can be used for textbooks, instructional materials, and school supplies.

#### **Student Success Stories**

- A current CalWORKs student was affected by homelessness and acquired permanent housing. A
  continuing student has applied to 4 CSUs, 1 UC, and 1 out of state university.
- A number of students stopped to share their appreciation of our career peer ambassador program by communicating their positive feedback with the Career Center supervisor.
- During the Transfer, Career, and Evaluations/Grand Canyon University *Fuel for Finals* event one student commented that the bagel and coffee provided (on a Monday) were the first he had eaten over the weekend. This is a bitter sweet success story but the GCU and TCE staff were happy to provide some form of comfort and support to a student who was clearly in need.

We know that dance along with focused concentration relieves the mind of stress and worry. We aim to provide alternatives to our students for stress relief to ward off anxiety and depression. Mesa Student and Peer Educator Phuong taught us "the Floss" and Hip Hop dancing. Phuong is learning to lip read English and is taking ASL (she is HOH). We are so proud of her courage! Phuong learned lip reading in her home country of Viet Nam. She recently emigrated to the US and became a Mesa student and Peer Educator.

We know that an important part of our students' lives is exercise and we keep ourselves aware of the many ways we and our students can get exercise. There was lots of bonding during the dancing part of the retreat.

At the retreat, we learned from a farmer and former Astrophysicist/Special Needs Attorney about the high nutritional value of micro-green plants that can be grown inexpensively in your indoor garden. Students can grow high vitamin yield greens in very small containers at home.

#### **Innovations & Data**

#### **Direct Student Support:**

For the Fall 2018 semester SSE reviewed 94 applications for assistance and was able to provide direct support to 67 of those students. In total SSE gave out \$10,551 in support (an average of \$158 per a student) \$7800 was in book support, \$1850 in food support, \$881 in transportation support (in addition to semester passes given out by EOPS) and \$20 in printing support.

In January we have received 35 application, seen 16 students and provided Direct Support to 15 students to date. In total we have given out \$2478 in support. \$1800 for books, \$500 for food and \$178 for transportation (This is in addition to the semester bus passes for EOPS students.)

#### The Stand:

During the Fall 2018 semester The Stand provided services to 1217 individual students, giving out 21,888 items of food. We gave out 766 items of clothing.

The Stand: Farmers Market provided 57,349 pounds of free food to the campus community serving in total 3834 households averaging 766 households per an event.

In January The Stand has provided services to 470 individual students, giving out a total of 2416 items to date. We have given out 125 items of clothing.

The Stand: Farmers Market held its first event on January 31st, we gave out 7,616 pounds of produce and nearly 3725 pounds of shelf stable goods.

The Stand: Pop-up Market began in January as the campus was connected through Feed San Diego with Smart & Final and The Ronald McDonald House. This allowed for more access to free food for our students. We have on provided an additional 591 pounds from Smart & Final and a van full from The Ronald McDonald house. Because we are a secondary receiver from The Ronald McDonald house we do not weigh that food.

Additionally in the month of January we received a donation of approximately 360 pounds of bacon from Smithfield Farms via our partnership with Feeding San Diego.

Alliant will host a 2 part event. They have welcome back table and will host a Psychology Major Info session with an Alliant Professor in February.

SDSU was able to come out to the TC and provide assistance with the SDSU supplemental application.

The TC will host it's first, "Tapas and Transfer," an open house style informative transfer session with light snacks as a part of the Welcome week activities.

#### **Events & Activities**

Our final CUE Advisory Committee Meeting, hosted by Vice President Hands, was a successful summary of the committee's progress. The meeting included an overview of our edited Equity Crosswalk, an activity on putting the Crosswalk to use, a commitment to put the Crosswalk into practice and a group reflection on our 2 year project. Next Steps include soft implementation of the Crosswalk during Spring 2019, additional editing and campus-wide implementation Fall 2019.

Hosted by Compton College, Vice President Hands attended the Real #114 Housing & Food Insecurities Conference which focused on housing and food insecurities for college students throughout the country and in the communities we serve, and how faculty can support students and provide the basic necessities they need to be successful. Topics included: What is the profile of our student community? What are students struggling with? How does the struggle impact students and create barriers to their educational success? Other challenges including enrollment changes based on a shift in demographics; retaining students who have pressing economic needs; and serving students adequately when the college itself has limited resources.

Vice President Hands worked with Ben Daley, Provost at High Tech High, to coordinate a Mesa College Team to join them on visit to Georgia State University. The purpose of this trip is to learn more about the well regarded work that Georgia State is doing to increase college graduation rates, especially for African American students, and to consider how schools in our region (K12 and postsecondary) might work together or on our own to make similar progress.

At the Spring 2019 Convocation Vice President Hands presented Student Services Updates and Mesa Colleges Journey to become the Leading College of Equity and Excellence.

Vice President Hands attended a Regional Strong Workforce Program Meeting to discuss current efforts, participated in a campus-wide Tabletop Exercise to prepare for campus emergencies, volunteered at our Welcome Booth during Welcome Week, engaged our Title V 2019 Grant Planning process, presented Student Services Administrative Unit Outcomes to the Committee on Outcomes and Assessment, attended the YMCA
