Mesa College Stands Together

The college and our employees and students have been experiencing violent and racist zoom bomb incidents in the last 2 weeks. We condemn these incidents and we are responding together, please read [President Luster's letter](#) to the campus regarding these actions.

New SDCCD Board Member Geysil Arroyo Appointed

Public health consultant Geysil Arroyo has been appointed to fill a vacant seat on the San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) Board of Trustees. After a nomination period, the governing board made its decision during a special February 8 meeting. Arroyo, who grew up in Tijuana and San Diego and attended both San Diego City and Mesa colleges before matriculating to UC San Diego, earned a master's degree in public health from Columbia University in New York and serves on the San Diego County Health Services Advisory Board. She will serve on the Board of Trustees as the Area E representative.

The Area E vacancy was created when former trustee Sean Elo-Rivera was elected in November to the San Diego City Council. The Board of Trustees decided to appoint a replacement to fill the final two years of Elo-Rivera's term because they felt the appointment process afforded more opportunities to thoroughly review potential candidates, and also because the cost of calling a special election, estimated at up to \$650,000, was considered prohibitive.

Chancellor Search Finalists Announced

In February, the San Diego Community College District Board of Trustees announced that they had selected [four \(4\) finalists for the next Chancellor of the District](#). The finalists for the Chancellor position include, St. Charles (Missouri) Community College President Barbara Kavalier, Ph.D.; Pima (Arizona) Community College Chancellor Lee Lambert, J.D.; San Diego Mesa College President Pamela Luster, Ed.D.; and San Diego College of Continuing Education President Carlos O. Turner Cortez, Ph.D. Forums to interview candidates for the chancellor position were held from February 22-25, and gave faculty, classified professionals, administrators, students, and the public an opportunity to meet and learn more about the four finalists. The Board is aiming to make a final selection and announce the new Chancellor in late March, with the goal of having the new Chancellor start July 1, 2021.



Edquity Launch

This Spring, we officially kicked off a partnership with Edquity to help bring emergency grants and resources to students experiencing a financial crisis. Thanks to the San Diego Mesa College Resiliency Fund, all enrolled students, regardless of credit amount or non-credit degree enrolled status, who were in need of emergency aid, such as funding for housing or food, had access. We were able to give out almost \$20,000 in awards to Mesa College students during the first three weeks of the semester.


While these emergency funds are expended for the semester, the Edquity app can be used to find local community basic needs resources near you. The app also has a financial budgeting tool as well.



Mesa2030

The Mesa2030 Task Force resumed its work this spring semester, with the first meeting on February 16. During the meeting, we were given the opportunity to look at results of the various campus engagement events that have taken place since fall 2020, and most recently the results of a campus survey, student focus groups, and a sustainability workshop that took place Friday, February 26. The sustainability workshop was hosted by the Environmental Sustainability Committee and Gensler, our Mesa2030 consultants. Mesa2030 will be holding a neighborhood community forum on Monday, March 8, to give a summary of the work we have done so far, and to include our community in the process.

We are in the final stages of drafting our Mesa2030 goals which focus on Community, Completion, Pathways & Partnerships, Stewardship, and Scholarship. The Task Force has worked with Gensler to create specific facilities planning principles that are guiding our facilities portion of the plan. The focuses for our facilities planning framework are: student-centered, welcoming environments, connected campus, community asset, and stewardship of resources. Using these facilities planning guiding principles, we have the opportunity to support the long range vision and goals of San Diego Mesa College.

The Planning and Institutional Effectiveness Committee has charged a Task Force to begin working on a Roadmap to Mesa2030, using the Mesa2030 goals as our planning framework, and identifying Strategic Objectives for the next 5 years.

Mesa Pathways

Mesa Pathways continues to advance its important work. Led by Ian Duckles and Cynthia Rico from the Guided Majors and Mapping Workgroup, mixers occurred on February 16 and 22. So far, 19 faculty members from 14 disciplines, as well as 3 counseling faculty members, have been present at the mixers. Pathways Fellows have also been actively participating and providing the student voice in these discussions. Upcoming March mixers will be held on March 3, 12, 18, and 22.

The Guided Pathways Self-Assessment has been circulated through all of the governance groups, approved by President's Cabinet, and submitted to the Chancellor's Office prior to the March 1 deadline. Thank you to everyone who participated in this important process.

Mesa Pathways Committee is making up to \$50,000 available to fund projects related to advancing our Mesa Pathways efforts here on campus. Projects must relate to Mesa Pathways efforts by identifying which of the four pillars of Pathways it relates to (Clarify the Path, Enter the Path, Staying on the Path and Ensure Learning). Funding will not be granted for food, travel, or


events. The maximum award amount will be \$5,000. Recipients do not have to spend funds by the end of Spring 2021 semester. Deadlines:

- Proposals must be submitted by March 15, 2021.
- Recipients will be announced and notified on April 5, 2021.
